Adolescent Access to Abortion Care and Services



What we stand for:

The Michigan Organization on Adolescent Sexual Health (MOASH) supports unrestricted access to safe, legal, and affordable abortion services for adolescents in accordance with federal law. It is the right of all people, including young people, to have the tools necessary to control their reproductive health. In addition to the restrictive abortion laws all people face, youth must overcome significant challenges in order to obtain this legal medical procedure. Specifically, minors' access to abortion is often obstructed by the legal mandate for parental consent or a court-provided waiver of parental consent, obtained only via judicial bypass process. We support the removal of the parental consent mandate in Michigan.¹

Why we stand for this:

- Abortion is a safe and legal medical procedure.² Young people should be supported in their choice to access abortion services, just as they would be supported in their choice to access any other safe and legal healthcare service.
- When educated on all their options after becoming pregnant, young people are able to make well-informed decisions about their bodies– including if and when to become a parent.
- Young people face barriers in seeking abortion and abortion care in Michigan. These barriers (e.g., 24-hour mandatory waiting period, cost and lack of insurance coverage, transportation, etc.) are particularly burdensome to adolescents.³
- For minors (under 18 years) who want an abortion, parental consent is not always available. These minors are oftentimes the young people who face additional barriers, including homelessness, pregnancy as a result of incest, or abusive or violent family home.⁴
- The judicial bypass process to attain a parental consent waiver is not youth-friendly. Rulings are subjective, court procedures and legal jargon on documents can be unclear, and timing can lead to delays in obtaining care, which can necessitate a more expensive and invasive procedure.⁵
- Expert organizations in the field of adolescent sexual health, including the American Medical Association, Society for Adolescent Medicine, American Public Health Association, American College of Obstetrics and Gynecologists, and American Academy of Pediatrics, oppose the parental consent mandate and judicial bypass process.

Data and statistics:

- In 2018, 37.6% of Michigan residents receiving induced abortions were under 25 years of age, while 8.7% were less than 20 years old. There were a total of 2,227 reported induced abortions for women under 20 and 7,371 reported induced abortions for women ages 20-24.⁶
- Studies show that availability of contraceptives reduces rates of unintended pregnancy and abortions. Young people in Michigan have limited and/or inconsistent access to contraceptive options that prevent unintended pregnancy. Policies or legislation can improve contraceptive access, such as mandated coverage of birth control under insurance policies and repealing the state law prohibiting condom/contraceptive distribution in schools⁷
