<p>HB 4219 : Probation and Deferral Programs for Human Trafficking Victims</p> <p>This bill would allow criminal courts to place possible victims of human trafficking in probation and deferral programs. <p>SB 52 : Eliminating the Statute of Limitations for Child Sex Abuse</p> <p>This bill would eliminate the statute of limitations for child sexual abuse crimes.</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Steven Bieda</i></p>			10/17/17

<p>HB 4500 : Classifying a Fetus or Embryo as a Victim in Criminal Proceedings</p> <p>This bill would modify the current criminal sentencing guidelines, which includes assessing the number of victims involved in a violent crime. The current guidelines suggest counting any person who was in danger as a victim, and this bill would add that "For purposes of this section, an embryo or fetus must be counted as a person."</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Pamela Hornberger</i></p>

<p>HB 4552/4553 : Adding "Dismemberment Abortion" to the "Partial-Birth" Abortion Ban</p> <p>These bills would add a ban on the dilation and evacuation (D&E) and curettage abortion procedure (using forceps or other medical instruments) to the same act that bans "partial-birth" (or dilation and extraction) abortion procedures. <p>SB 376: Revise Abortion Complication Reporting Law</p> <p>This bill would mandate that state health officials to create an abortion complication reporting form separate from the reporting already required by abortion service providers. <p>SB 412 and HB 4762 : Prohibit Restrictions on Health Professionals to Provide Medically Accurate Information</p> <p>These bills would prohibit government agencies from telling health professionals to provide medically inaccurate or inappropriate information to patients. It would also prevent agencies from telling doctors that they cannot provide medically accurate information. <p>SB 443: Revise the Definition of "Bullying" in the School Code</p> <p>This bill would change the school code's definition of "bullying" and "cyberbullying" to specify that it must be "repeated" behavior "that involves a real or perceived power imbalance between pupils."</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Darwin Boohar</i></p>	6/8/17				
<p>HB 4716: Terminate Parental Rights for Female Genital Mutilation</p> <p>This bill would allow for the state to take away someone's parental rights for subjecting their child to female genital mutilation.</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Peter Lucido</i></p>					Signed into law 12/7/17 with immediate effect

<p>SB 453 and HB 4765 : Prohibit Refusals to Perform Abortion Procedures</p> <p>These bills would restrict physicians and health facilities from refusing to provide reproductive health services, such as abortion procedures, if the refusal would "result in or prolong an imminent serious risk to the individual's life or health." <p>SB 454 and HB 4761 : Repeal the Abortion Insurance Opt-Out Act</p> <p>These bills would repeal the law from 2013, which prohibits healthcare policies sold on the state's exchange from including abortion coverage. <p>HB 4896-4899 : Provide Voluntary Funding Opportunities to Eliminate Sexual Assault Kit Analysis Backlog</p> <p>These bills would provide opportunities for people to donate a portion of their driver's license renewal fee, vehicle registration fees, or income tax to a fund that would help the state catch up on its backlog of rape evidence kits that have been collected but not yet analyzed.</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Robert Kosowski</i></p>	9/6/17				
<p>HB 4903 : Prohibit Insurers' Refusal to Provide Coverage for Criminal Sexual Conduct Victims</p> <p>This bill would prevent discrimination by insurance companies, so that they could not refuse to cover someone who had been a victim of a sexual crime.</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Robert Kosowski</i></p>	9/6/17				
<p>HB 4904 : Prohibit Insurers from Charging Different Rates Based on Sex</p> <p>This bill would prevent insurers or insurance companies from charging different rates for the same coverage based on the sex of the customer.</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Robert Kosowski</i></p>	9/6/17				
<p>SB 607 : Criminalize Sex Between Clergy and Person Seeking Spiritual Guidance</p> <p>This bill would criminalize sex between a clergy and a person they have one-on-one meetings with seeking religious or spiritual guidance (similar to prohibitions on sexual contact between counselors/therapists and their clients/patients). <p>HB 5462 : Eliminate the Statute of Limitations on all Criminal Sexual Conduct Offenses</p> <p>This bill would enhance current law so that would be no statute of limitations for second- and third-degree criminal sexual conduct cases. <p>SB 911: Allow Two Unmarried Adults to Adopt</p> <p>This bill would permit two unmarried adults to adopt a child; this would make adoption in Michigan more inclusive for same-sex couples.</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Curtis Hertel, Vincent Gregory, David Knezek</i></p>	3/20/18

<p>SB 967/968: Require Sexual Misconduct Form for Law Enforcement Agencies</p> <p>These bills ask for the creation of a standard form to report incidences of sexual misconduct by employees of a law enforcement agency. <p>HB 5977: Post Human Trafficking Hotline Number in Adult Entertainment Businesses</p> <p>This bill would require that adult entertainment businesses post signs with the state's human trafficking hotline number in the locker room area of the performers.</p> <p><i>Sponsored by: Erika Geiss, Leslie Love, LaTanya Garrett, Cara Clemente</i></p>	5/9/18

<p>HB 5982: Prohibit Interference in Campus Sexual Assault Reporting This bill would prohibit anyone in a "professional position of authority" at a college or university from using their influence to stop someone reporting an incident of sexual assault to the Title IX coordinator. <i>Sponsored by: Sara Cambensy</i></p>	5/24/18				
<p>HB 6036: Include Health Professionals in Child Abuse Definition This bill would amend the current definition of child abuse to also include health professionals in the list of perpetrators. <i>Sponsored by: Holly Hughes</i></p>	5/17/18				
<p>SB 1055: Create List and Require Disclosure for Vaccinations Containing "Immunizing Agent Derived from Aborted Fetal Tissue" This bill would require that MDHHS keep a list of "immunizing agents derived from aborted fetal tissue" (in reference to stem cell research) and alternatives. It would also require doctors and healthcare providers to tell patients receiving vaccinations whether the immunization contains those agents, if there are alternatives, and present the option for the patient to decline receiving the vaccine. <i>Sponsored by: Tonya Schuitmaker, Mike Kowall, Patrick Colbeck, Judy Emmons, Joe Hune, Mike Shirkey</i></p>	6/7/18				
<p>HB 6155-6179/6184 : Awareness and Leniency for Human Trafficking Victims Involved in "Commerical Sex Acts" These bills seek to provide protections and leniency for victims of human trafficking caught engaging in commercial sex acts. Many of the bills amend the term "prostitution" to read "commercial sex acts." The bills also create specialty "sex trade solicitation prevention" courts, create a victim services fund for those who have been trafficked, allow courts to clear the criminal record of persons who have been trafficked, and allow being trafficked as a defense in criminal court. <p>HB 6229-6235: Expand Parent/Adoption Rights for Same-Sex Couples These bills would allow same-sex couples great rights to adopt and legally parent children. They would also prevent adopt agencies from discriminating against same-sex couples and denying their adoption on moral or religious grounds.
